Abbot Jerome's activities

The triennial General Chapter of the American Cassinese Congregation was held at St. John's Abbey, Collegeville, Mn., June 8-15. There were 23 monasteries in this congregation, most of them in the United States, but there is one in Porto Rico, one in Mexico, and ours, in Canada. Each monastery sends its abbot (or prior), and one delegate chosen by the monks. This year, Fr. Leo Hinz and I drove, in Fr. Leo's car, enjoying the hospitality of Sr. Grace and her Benedictine community in Winnipeg, on the way to St. John's, and that of Abbot Lawrence and the monks of Assumption Abbey, Richardton, ND, on the way home.

The main work of the chapter was to finalize the constitutions of our congregation in accordance with the new code of Canon Law. At the same time as we met, the bishops of the United States, well over 200, were meeting at St. John's.

I attended two functions of the K of C: one at Muenster on April 13, and the other, the provincial convention, at Yorkton, on April 26. I also went to the meetings of the CWL, our diocesan convention at Englefeld on May 1, and the

provincial convention at North Battleford, on June 2. I joined the Humboldt CWL for Mass and a banquet as they celebrated their 60th anniversary.

On May 19 I went to St. Louis (Sask.) to join the Daughters of Providence for the jubilees of several of their sisters. Among them was Sr. Rita Gallagher, who has been a religious for 50 years, and who was honored with a

come-and-go tea at the residence of the sisters in Humboldt on June 1.

On my way home from St. Louis I detoured a bit to visit the shrine in honor of Mary at St. Laurent, and then went on to Duck Lake where I enjoyed a meal with Rose Brown who lives there.

As a girl my mother was a boarder for a year at the Daughters of Providence, while they were at Vegreville. I had a chance to visit this town when I travelled there by car to direct a retreat for some sisters of charity of Evron, June 18. The motherhouse of these sisters is in Evron, France and is in a former Benedictine monastery, which was taken over by the state during the French Revolution, and later given to the sisters for their use.

I attended the ordination to the priesthood of Fr. Stefano Penna and Fr. Leslie Paquin for the diocese of

Saskatoon, on May 9. I also was at the first Mass of Fr. Penna the next day, in Holy Spirit Church, and enjoyed the banquet afterwards in the cafeteria of the Bishop Mahoney High School.

On May 27 I was present at a concert in the Sutherland Theatre at the conclusion of the annual music festival. There I accepted a plaque which was presented to St. Peter's Abbey, in appreciation of all it had done in fostering music in the abbacy during the past years.

Tenth year

This issue of the Abbey Newsletter moves it into its tenth year. The first issue was dated March, 1976. It featured a cover photo of Father Wilfred Hergott cleaning snow off the sidewalks. Father Wilfred passed away that same year, Dec. 2. That issue also reported Brother Wolfgang Thiem making his profession of final (solemn) vows.

Father Peter Novecosky was the editor until 1983. Father Damian Yaskowich was main photographer. In the Summer, 1983 issue Father Damian took over as editor. He still continues to do most of the photography for each issue besides being editor. The Summer, 1983 issue featured the selling of our farm's complete dairy herd, marking the end of an operation on our farm which began in the early 1940s.

In recent years, regular contributors to the Newsletter are Abbot Jerome Weber, Father Albert Ruetz who supplies the oblate news, and Father Peter Novecosky who contributes the guestmaster's news.

The Abbey Newsletter is published four times a year, and is available to monks, relatives and friends of the abbey. Our oblates also receive the Newsletter.

Our mailing list includes about 600 readers, with extra issues distributed by individuals to readers not on the mailing list. We print 950 copies of each issue.

Cudworth honors Father Edward

Cudworth honored Father Edward Benning on Sunday, June 29 on the occasion of his 50th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood. At this parish, which he had served for many years, Father Edward concelebrated at the eucharist which was followed by a banquet and a program honoring the jubilarian.

As a conclusion to the program Father Edward expressed thanks to those who had helped to make the celebration such a happy occasion. He concluded with the words, "I now say goodbye." This underlined the fact that he will no longer be active in the parish of St. Michael's.

In February Father Edward suffered a stroke which paralized his left side and impaired his speech. He is slowly regaining his ability to speak.

Father Edward was ordained to the priesthood on June 6, 1936, in St. John's Abbey Church, Collegeville, MN by Bishop Joseph Busch of St. Cloud, MN.

From 1936 - 43 he taught a variety of high school classes at St. Peter's, including French, Latin, and religion.

During the summer of 1942 he assisted Father Rudolph Palm, OSB, at Lake Lenore, and then was administrator of the parish after the latter's death in August of that year.

In the fall of 1943 Father Edward was appointed pastor of St. Michael's Parish, Cudworth, St. Maurus Parish, Dana and chaplain of St. Michael Hospital. From 1945 - 61 he was Pastor of St. Michael's and St. Leo's, north of Cudworth. During this, his first parochial assignment, he began his devoted servce to the CWL, which has continued ever since.

In the fall of 1961 Father Edward became pastor of St. Bruno's Parish, Bruno; St. Agnes, Peterson; Holy Family, north of Bruno; and St. Maurus, Dana. In 1966 St. Agnes and Maurus were placed under the care of a priest resident at St. Peter's Abbey. During most of these years at Bruno he was chaplain of the sisters of the Ursuline Convent there.

From 1968 - 75 he was pastor of St. Augustine's and St. Dominic's, Humboldt. One of his successful projects there was the acquisition of a new gymnasium in joint ownership with St. Dominic's School, for Sunday and feastday services. He also organized St. Augustine's Parish Council (1970), the first in the abbacy.



In 1975 he became chaplain of St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Humboldt, and pastor at St. Joseph's Church, south of Fulda. He continued to serve on the Medico-moral commission, of which he had been a member already since 1971.

In 1978 he became pastor of Holy

Guardian Angels Parish, Englefeld, and Holy Rosary Parish, LeRoy.

Father Edward returned to Cudworth in 1981 as pastor of St. Michael's Church, chaplain to St. Michael's Hospital, and pastor of St. Luke's, Sagehill CFS (Dana). He was active here until his stroke this winter.

Vows and promises

During the eucharistic celebration on the feast of St. Benedict, July 11, two monks completed their year of novitiate. Brother Gerald Moran professed triennial vows, and Brother Nicodemus Amelsvoort made promises as a cloistral oblate.

Brother Gerald Moran, recently of Medicine Hat, Alberta, was born and raised on a farm in the Plato-Eston area of Saskatchewan, where his grandparents homesteaded in 1918. The family were pioneer members of St. Basil's Catholic Church in Plato where he was baptised and confirmed.

His schooling was taken at St. Peter's College, St. Joseph's Convent, Rosetown, and the Seminary of Christ the King, then located in Burnaby, B.C.

After a three year period with the Benedictines on the West Coast, Gerald entered the hotel industry in Saskatoon. He continued working as a night clerk for over thirty years in Vancouver and Calgary before moving to Medicine Hat.

Under the tudorship and encouragement of his organ teacher Fr. Norbert Schwinghammer, OSB, Gerald began playing the organ in his parish church of St. Basil's in Plato. When he moved to Saskatoon, he was invited to be organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, a position he held for seven years. He was assistant organist of St. Mary's Cathedral, Calgary, and organist of Canadian Martyrs' Church, Calgary, before moving to Medicine Hat in 1984.

Besides church choir music, Brother

Gerald's hobbies include barbering, enjoying the peace and quiet of gardening, early morning walks and bird preservation. Other interests include monastic studies and serving the Abbey guests, visitors and retreatants. His duties to date have been organist, barber, infirmarian, "home-care," and he has just been appointed assistant guestmaster.

In his immediate family, Brother Gerald has one sister, Mary Ellen Jones of Medicine Hat, and one brother, Dick of Saskatoon.

Brother Nicodemus (Frank) Amelsvoort was born in Holland in 1924. After high school, he joined the army and was taken prisoner to a German concentration camp for eight months, before being shipped to Canada in Oc-

tober, 1944. He fought in Germany, Holland and Belgium.


During his army days which took him to England, then Holland and Indonesia Brother Nicodemus worked as an air gunner and a cook.

Father Maurice Weber conducted a retreat at St. Elizabeth Convent, Humboldt, May 25 - June 2.


Father Francis Lohmer attended the Holy Childhood Society convention in Toronto, May 25 - 31.

25th anniversaries celebrated

June 10 marked the 25th anniversary of ordination to the priesthood for Fathers Daniel Muyres and Maurice Weber. Their home parishes honored them with special celebrations.

A parish and family celebration was held for Father Daniel in St. Gregor on Sunday, June 8. The mass was followed by a banquet for invited guests and a program in the local hall. A highlight of this program was a slide presentation on the life of Father Daniel. The parish presented him with an office chair.

A second celebration was put on by the parish of St. Scholastica, Sunday, June 22. Father Maurice concelebrated the Eucharist with Father Daniel. Again, a tasty meal was served at midday, followed by a program of presentations and songs to honor him. The parish gifted him with an easy chair.

The parish of the Sacred Heart in Watson was the scene for a celebration honoring their native son, Father Maurice. This was held on Tuesday evening, June 10. Father George gave the homily at the mass, as he had done at Father Maurice's first mass 25 years ago. A delicious meal was followed by a program of presentations and songs. Ramona McFadyen, twin sister of Father Maurice, gave a descriptive

history of the life of her ordained brother.

Father Daniel Muyres

Daniel Muyres was born at St. Gregor where he received his schooling before coming to St. Peter's College for Grades 11, 12 and arts. At St. Peter's he took part in several major dramatic productions.

He received his seminary training at St. John's Abbey, Collegeville. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 10, 1961 by Bishop Francis Klein at St. Peter's Cathedral, Muenster.

At St. Peter's College he was prefect of students for three years, and taught in the high school for four years (1961 - 64), during which time he was in charge of the typewriting department.

He has been parish assistant at Humboldt (1969 - 70) and Bruno (1970-72); pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Fulda (1972 - 74); and since 1975 pastor of St. Scholastica's Parish, Burr.

He took a year for studies in 1974 at St. Paul's University, Ottawa, and received a master's degree in pastoral studies.

A major contribution of Father Daniel to the community has been that

of business manager for the abbey, college, farm and press. He began as assistant to the late Father Leonard Benning and supplemented his experience with a course in accounting at the University of Saskatchewan.

As business manager, Father Daniel has also been a member of the senior Council since 1966. From 1975 - 78 he was subprior of the community.

This fall, after being pastor of St. Scholastica for 11 years, Father Daniel will become pastor of Marysburg.

Father Maurice Weber

Raymond Weber was born at Watson and received his schooling there before coming to St. Peter's College for Grades 11, 12 and arts. He was active in dramatics, public speaking and the year book staff.

In 1954 he entered the novitiate of St. Peter's Abbey, receiving Maurice as his monastic name. On July 11, 1955, he made his first profession of vows.

He did his seminary studies at St. John's Abbey. He was ordained to the priesthood at St. Peter's Cathedral, Muenster, on June 10, 1961, by Bishop Francis Klein of Saskatoon.

At St. Peter's College Father Maurice taught religion, literature, and chemistry in the high school from 1961-64. Then he studied chemistry at the University of Saskatchewan and at St. Louis University, St. Louis, Missouri

(1965 - 67), receiving his master of science degree.

From 1967 - 76 he taught chemistry in Grades 11, 12 and arts at St. Peter's College and, from 1972 - 76, at St. Ursula's Academy, Bruno. He was also part-time prefect of students, chaplain of students (1968 - 72) and moderator of the student paper.


From 1973 - 76 he was principal of St. Peter's College, when he supervised the adjustment of St. Peter's from the status of a boarding school to that of a day school.

Since 1961 Father Maurice has also been active in pastoral work: assistant priest in St. Peter's Cathedral and St. Gregory's Parish (1961 - 62) and assistant priest at St. Bruno's Parish and part-time chaplain at St. Ursula's Academy, Bruno (1971 - 74).

In the fall of 1976 Father Maurice went to study theology and monastic history and spirituality at the International Benedictine College of San' Anselmo in Rome, where he received his licentiate in theology in 1978. During his stay in Europe he visited many Benedictine monasteries plus the Holy Land.

Since his return he is assisting in the instruction of novices, is dean of students and religious co-ordinator at St. Peter's College, is vocation director for St. Peter's Abbey.

In 1982 Father Maurice returned to the principalship of St. Peter's College.

Completes lay ministries program

Sunday, June 8, 1986 Richard Meidl, along with 15 other men and women of the Regina Archdiocese, celebrated their completion of the Regina Lay Ministries Formation Program.

The Regina Lay Ministries Formation Program is three years in length. Each year consists of one weekend per month from September to June. The program is one of formation to develop an awareness of church and the responsibility of Christians to minister. It invites one to grow in areas of spirituality, knowledge, and community building. This is done through sessions in scripture, current theology, liturgy, morality, ministry, social justice and spirituality.

The final celebrations took the form of a noon meal at the John Paul II Centre in Regina for the candidates and their families. This was followed by an Eucharistic Celebration at Holy Rosary Cathedral with Archbishop Charles Halpin, Presider. St. Benedict makes this clear in the Rule, "Let the Abbot so moderate all things that there be something for the strong to strive after and nothing to dishearten the weak." (Chapter 64)

Faith, prayers and cancer

To many of our readers, the name Brother Oswald King may have little meaning, but to his fellow monks at the Abbey he is well known. Brother Oswald joined the community in 1939. Since then he has spent most of his working time either in the carpenter shop or in some other building on the abbey grounds repairing, building or installing some equipment, many times of his own invention. He is also one of the very few around the college and abbey who has dared to go on top of the roof of Michael Hall. He erected the five-foot cross that tops the bell tower (which he has repaired many times). He has often repaired the college building roof and has painted it three times.

One project that Brother has enjoyed over the years is the repairing, designing and building of bicycles. He has designed and built different models, one which can be pedaled with your hands, another one pedaled by hands and feet.


This past year has seen Brother Oswald taking things easier. Early this year he began having difficulty in sleeping at nights and experienced loss of appetite. In March, the doctors diagnosed Brother has an inoperable cancer on his lung. the cancer produces a fluid which fills up his lung cavity and requires draining about every two weeks.

Brother Oswald is now relying on the goodness and the power of Almighty God along with his knowledge of herbs, vitamin diets and magentic therapy to help relieve him of the discomfort


