Abbot Jerome's activities

Abbot Jerome attended the meeting of the Catholic Bishops of Saskatchewan in Saskatoon, on January 20. The next day they met with the three Anglican Bishops of Saskatchewan to discuss matters of common concern, such as interfaith marriages.

On Monday, Feb. 8, he attended a meeting in Saskatoon, at the Catholic Centre with men and women religious superiors of Saskatchewan. This discussion concerned the collaboration of the Bishops and the Religious in various ways in the dioceses of Saskatchewan.

He went to St. Bernard's Abbey, in Alabama on February 15, for a workshop with about 50 other Benedictine Abbots and Priors of North America. Abbot John Eudes Bamberger, OCSO of Genesee Abbey, was the moderator. From his experience as a psychiatrist, monk and abbot, he gave many insights into the stages of personal growth.

En route to Alabama, he stopped at Chicago for a visit to St. Procopius Abbey, in Lisle, and also visited his Aunt, Mrs. Mae Koett, the widow of his Uncle Ferdinand in Brookfield.

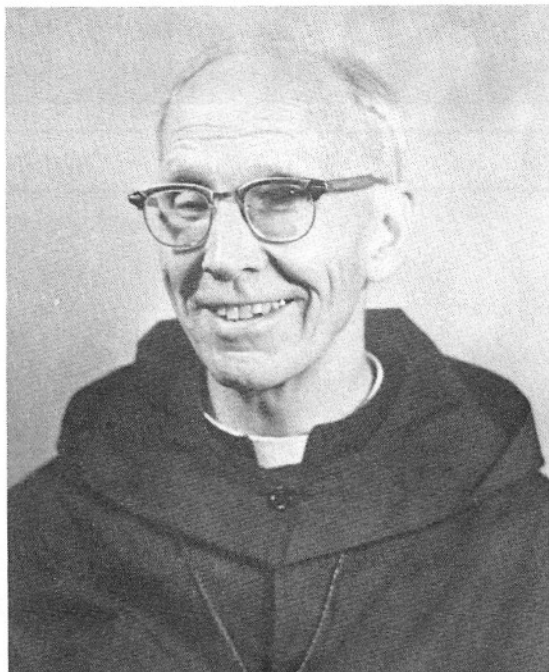
From Alabama he went directly to Edmonton, to the Grey Nuns' Centre for the annual meeting of the Catholic Bishops of Western Canada. Here one of the important topics for discussion was the feasibility of a Catholic Bible School for Western Canada.

He joined the Grey Nuns and many others in celebrating the 75th anniversary of St. Paul's Hospital, Saskatoon, on March 13.

On March 26 he was in Regina, at Sr. McGuigan High School, for a meeting of TRACE (Teachers of Religious and Christian Ethics). Rev. John Westerhoff, an Anglican clergyman, gave some good suggestions and thoughts on the topic, "Will our Children have Faith?"

The Knights of Columbus of Saskatchewan are celebrating the 100th anniversary of their beginning in 1982, and the 75th anniversary of their existence in this province. To mark these events there was a celebration in Regina, April 23-24, during the Annual Convention, which Abbot Jerome attended.

Confirmations began on Sunday, April 25, at St. Benedict. On subsequent Sundays, Abbot

Jerome was at St. Bruno, St. Augustine, St. Agnes, Holy Trinity, Canadian Martyrs, St. Anthony, St. George, St. Michael, St. Ann, St. Peter and St. Gregory, the last being on June 13.

The 34th Annual Convention of the Saskatchewan CWL was held at Humboldt, June 7-8. He was present at the banquet and was principal celebrant and homilist at the mass on June 8.

Abbot Jerome attended a farewell honoring retiring Cardinal Flahiff, and the installation of his successor, Bishop Adam Exner of Kamloops, as new archbishop of Winnipeg, June 22,23.

During a mass at St. Ursula's Convent, June 27, Abbot Jerome presided at the brief ceremony for the installation of the new Sister Superior Juliana Weber and her council.

On August 10, he will be travelling to Brasil with Father Bernard Stauber to visit our mission team there for two weeks.

On June 15, *Father Rudolph Novecosky* underwent stereotactic surgery for a procedure

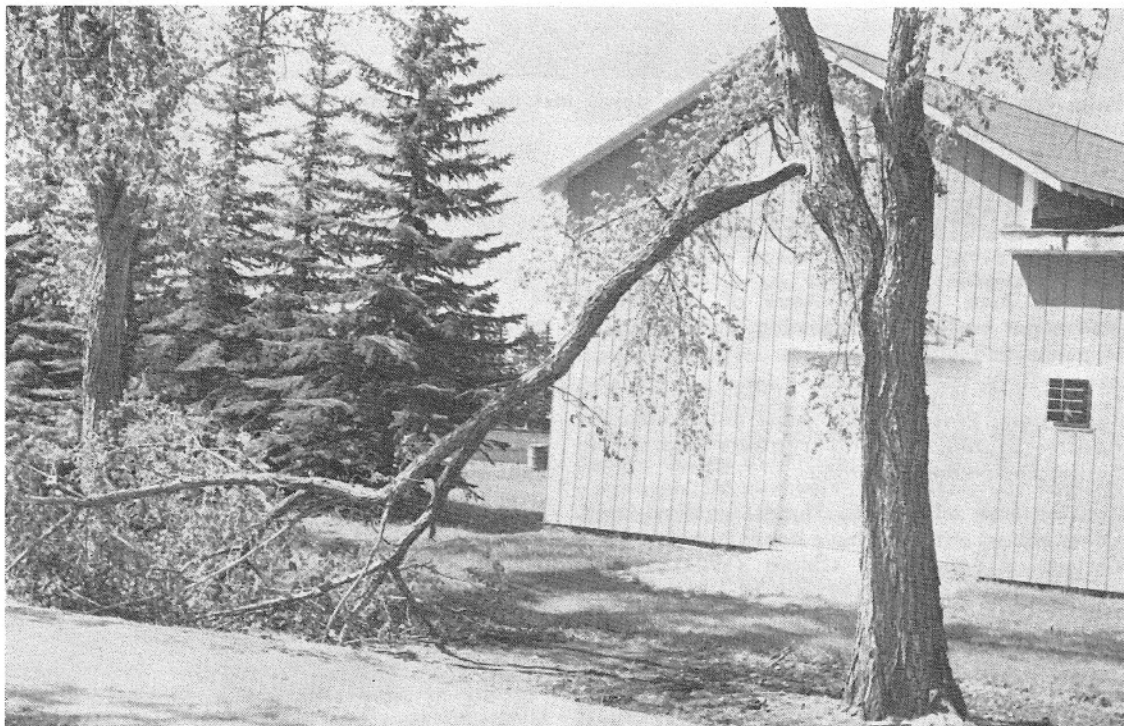

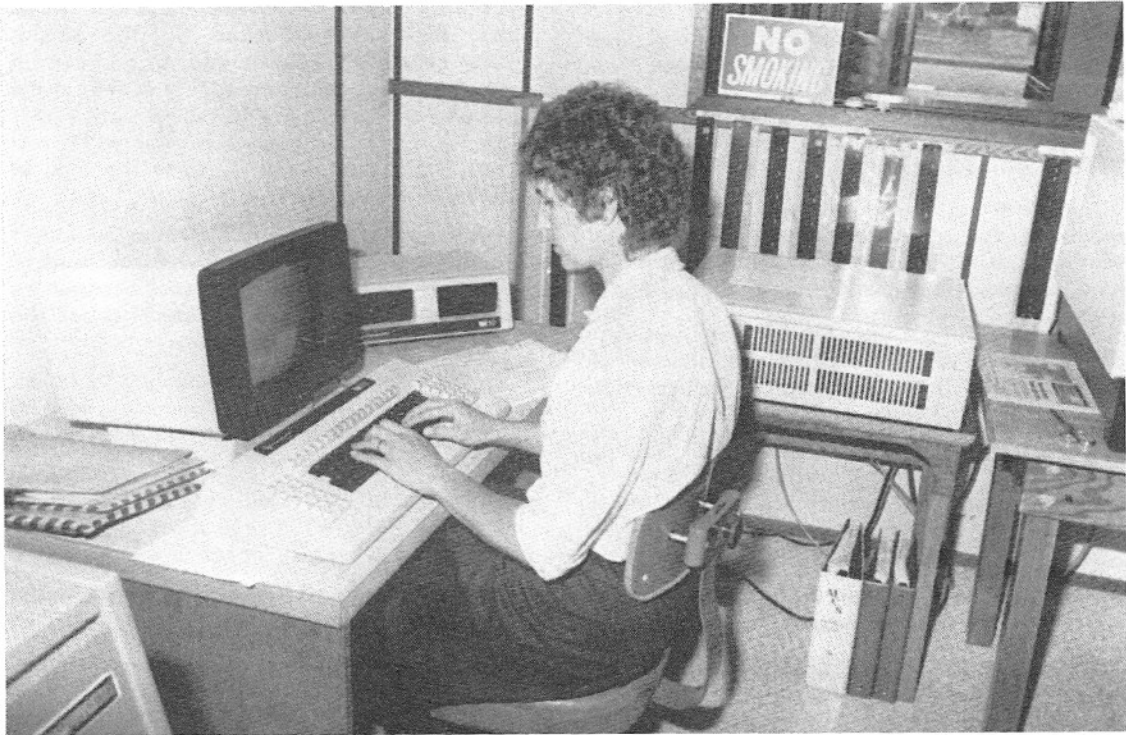

60th anniversary

The June 13, 1982 issue of the *Prairie Messenger* marked the beginning of its 60th year of publication.

The first issue, May 24, 1923, claimed five subscribers. Presently our subscription numbers nearly 14,000, serving readers mainly in Saskatchewan and Manitoba.

The first editor was Father Ignatius Groll. Other editors of the PM have been: Father Lewis J. Gwynn, a Benedictine Oblate (1924); Father Cosmas Krumpelmann (1924 - 26); Father John Hable (1926 - 31); Father Wilfrid Hergott (1931 - 55); Father Augustine Nenzel (1955 - 62); Father James Gray (1962 - 72); Father Michael Pomedli (1972 - 76); Brother Bede Hubbard (1976 - 81); Patrick Jamieson (1981 - 82). Father Peter Novocosky is presently managing editor.

PM wins award

The *Prairie Messenger* received the 1982 general excellence award from the Catholic Press Association (CPA), its fifth such award since 1975.

In choosing the PM for this year's award, the judges stated, "An excellent newspaper which has the following qualities: A balanced proportion of local, national and world news, appealing graphics, professional layout, a judicious use of white space, an effective use of color, high quality photo reproduction, well-chosen and well-written stories, features, and editorials, attractive and interesting back pages, and wise placement of advertisements."

The judges went on to commend the PM for its "variety of story selection, large proportion of staff-generated copy, effective use of color, and graphic excellence."

Golden anniversaries of ordination

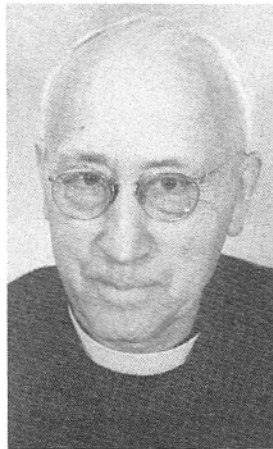
Two monks, both members of the first class of students when St. Peter's College opened in October 1921, celebrated the golden anniversary of their ordination to the priesthood this summer. Father Augustine Nenzel was honored at his home parish, St. Peter's, Muenster and Father Alphonse Ludwig at the parish he was still serving at, St. George's, Naicam. They entered the novitiate at St. Peter's Abbey on July 8, 1925 and made their monastic vows on July 17, 1926. They were ordained to the priesthood on June 29, 1932 by Bishop Joseph Prud'homme. A third classmate, Father Gregory Gasser passed away, August 2, 1977.

Father Augustine Nenzel

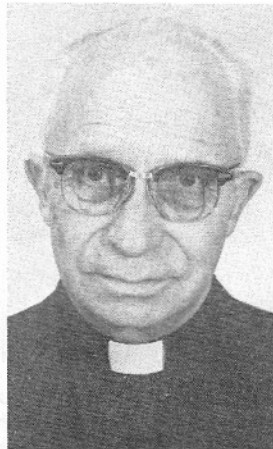
Father Augustine was born in Nenzel, Nebraska, Dec. 19, 1901, and arrived at Rosthern March 21, 1903, in a snowstorm. He began his elementary schooling at Muenster, continued it at the mission school at Cranbrook, B.C., where his father was a ranch foreman, and completed it at St. Louis College of the Oblate Fathers at New Westminster, B.C., in 1917. He returned to Muenster with his family in June 1917 and spent the next three years working in his father's farm, with time out in the late fall for custom-threshing with a steam outfit in the Rosetown district.

Father Augustine resided at St. Peter's Abbey for 30 years after his ordination (1932-1962), with the exception of two years sick-leave at Cudworth and one year in the Saskatchewan Sanatorium, Saskatoon. Alumni of St. Peter's College remember him especially as student prefect for eight years, student chaplain for 11 years, and director of dramatics for 20 years, during which period the students presented at least one, and usually two, major dramatic productions each year. He was editor of the *Prairie Messenger* from 1955 to 1962, and weekend chaplain at St. Ursula's Academy and Convent, Bruno, during the same period. Since 1962 he has been assistant pastor and chaplain at Bruno and Humboldt, and pastor at Bruno (1969-1970), Carmel (1964-1967), St. Benedict (1970-1979), and Middle Lake with Bethany Village (1972-1979), and Chaplain at St Elizabeth Hospital, Humboldt (1979 to the present).

The 50th anniversary mass was concelebrated at St. Peter's Cathedral on Sunday, July 4. Following mass, a supper served by the Muenster ladies and members of the St. Elizabeth Hospital staff was held at the Muenster Community Hall. An evening program at which tributes were given Father Augustine by those whom he had ministered to as pastor and chaplain and by relatives concluded the celebration.

Father Alphonse Ludwig

Father Alphonse was born on May 24, 1905, at Fulda, Sask. (then still North West Territories). He moved with his family to Bruno in 1915 and took his elementary schooling there from the pioneer Ursuline Sisters Mother Antonia and Mother Agatha. After school hours he worked as printer's apprentice on the *Bruno Leader*. After graduating from St. Peter's College, he declined an offer from a Minneapolis baseball team, and entered the novitiate at St. Peter's Abbey on July 8, 1925.

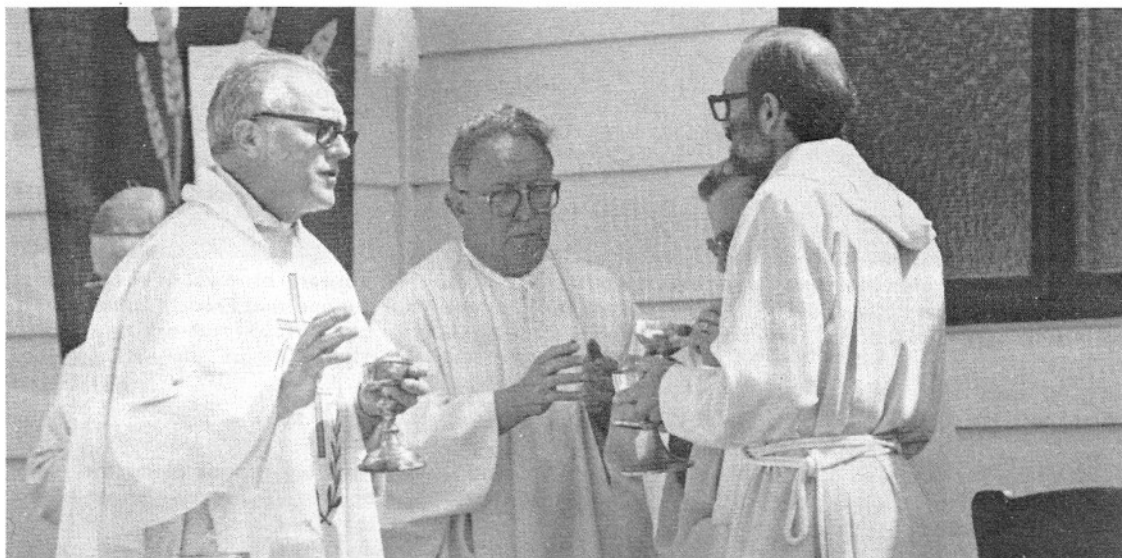
After his ordination to the priesthood in 1932 Father Alphonse continued to teach at St. Peter's College until 1938. He was prefect of students and sports director for two years (1932-1934), coaching outstanding hockey teams. From 1934-1938 he was business manager of St. Peter's Press, during a time of expansion in both circulation and equipment. While still residing at St. Peter's Abbey he filled a number of parochial assignments: assistant at Fulda (1935) and Humboldt (1936); pastor of St. Agnes parish, Peterson (1935-1939); first pastor of Holy Martyr's parish, Middle Lake (1935-1939). From 1939 to the present he has been

resident pastor of the following parishes: Carmel and Immaculate Conception (1939-1948); St. Benedict (1948-1960); Englefeld and LeRoy (1960-1970); Naicam (1970 to 1982). Father Alphonse now resides at Carmel.

During the years of his pastoral ministry Father Alphonse has supervised an extraordinary number of construction projects: the church hall (used as the first church) at Middle Lake, 1936; Our Lady of Mt. Carmel church, 1947; St. Benedict church, 1958; Englefeld rectory, 1961; LeRoy,

remodeling and extension of the church, 1964; Naicam, remodeling and extension of the church, 1971-1972. During the building program at St. Peter's in the '60s he served on the building board and acted as assistant foreman.

Celebrations marking Father Alphonse's 50th anniversary were held at Naicam, Sunday, June 27. Following the afternoon jubilee mass at which Father Alphonse was principal celebrant, a short program of presentations was held in the church basement. This was followed by a chicken supper.

Silver jubilee

Father Werner Renneberg celebrated the 25th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood in June.

An anniversary mass was celebrated June 12 at the old St. Leofeld Church, near Cudworth. The church, no longer used, was Father Werner's home parish and was the first church in St. Peter's Abbey.

A celebration was also held June 13 at Pilger for the five parishes Father Werner serves in his pastoral district: St. Bernard's, Pilger, Middle Lake, St. Benedict and Marysburg. Mass was followed by a program and a potluck supper. During the program parishioners from the five parishes put on

a skit depicting each of the five decades of Father Werner's life.

Father Werner was born at Leofeld in 1925. He joined the Benedictine community at St. Peter's Abbey, Muenster, in 1950 and was ordained priest June 1, 1957.

After ordination he was assistant at Humboldt and Muenster, taught at St. Peter's College, was manager of St. Peter's Press and served as pastor of Muenster and St. Gregor (1970-77) and of Pilger, Middle Lake and St. Bernard's (1977-82) and St. Benedict's (since 1980).

This summer he will move to Humboldt where he will join Father Leo Hinz at St. Augustine's Parish.

The guestmaster's report

This spring has been a busy time for Severin Hall. We've had a variety of guests and groups — and the building has now also received a facelifting.

This has been the busiest spring ever. Freda Hilgers, with the assistance of Pat Weber and the occasional assist from Sister Mary Smith, has had her hands full with keeping the rooms tidy, the floors shiny and the beds neat. And the crew has done a marvelous job.

For the past several years Severin Hall has had a problem with leaky roofs. The stained ceiling tile in the corridor and in some of the rooms are evident testimony to this. Each rain kept the guestmaster busy emptying pails hidden above the ceiling tile. In addition, the roof insulation had all its insulating value soaked out of it and the north end of Severin Hall was always cold in winter.

This June a new sloped roof was added on top the old flat roof. The advantage of this type of roof, with R40 insulation added, proved its value on the abbey last year.

There were two big groups using the guest facilities early this year. The Saskatchewan Indian Recreation Directors Training Program, sponsored by the Saskatchewan Indian community College, Saskatoon, has been here for two two-week sessions. The first session was Jan. 25-Feb. 4 and the second from April 19-30. A third session is scheduled for Sept. 19-Oct 1 and a fourth will be held early next year. Program co-ordinators are Judy Anderson and Angus McLean.

The 34 Indian recreation directors are from all parts of Saskatchewan, with the farthest being from Fond du Lac. Program staff members and students find the rural setting of St. Peter's, and the food, ideal.

The department of social service, Regina, has sponsored five one-week sessions here. The first three were for supervisors across the province working in the child protection section; the last two weeks were for the case workers. Experts on child abuse were brought in from the U.S. and Canada to help the 50-plus participants at each session.

A number of youth groups were here. A 4-H group from northeast Saskatchewan was here at the end of January. Some Newman university students from Saskatoon also came here for a January weekend get-together.

In early February about 70 students from the Swift Current Bible School came for a couple days to see what monasticism is all about. A dozen students from Aldersgate College in Moose Jaw, North America's Free Methodist Bible College, came here during Holy Week to take part in our Holy Week liturgy and get a taste of monastic life. They found the experience a "highlight" of their year and next year 30 students plan to come.

Two Lutheran pastors in Yorkton are reviving a youth group and they brought a group of 40 lively young people here the May 1 weekend. Later in May a United Church confirmation class spent a weekend here. An Abbacy Vocations and Ministries Committee workshop attracted about two dozen people, young and older, in early May.

A good representation of Serena couples were here for a provincial workshop on natural family

planning Feb. 12 - 14. The previous weekend a group of elders from Grosvenor Park United Church, Saskatoon, had a weekend workshop here.

The Abbacy Engaged Encounter got off to a good start with a full house the first weekend in March. Another emergency session was booked in late June. The second week of March about a dozen priests were here for a workshop on social justice. And that weekend the Abbacy Marriage Encounter had eight couples take part in an enriching weekend. March 20 was reserved for oblates of the abbey who took part in an Oblate Day program organized by Father Albert Ruetz, director of oblates. Another Oblate Day was held July 10.

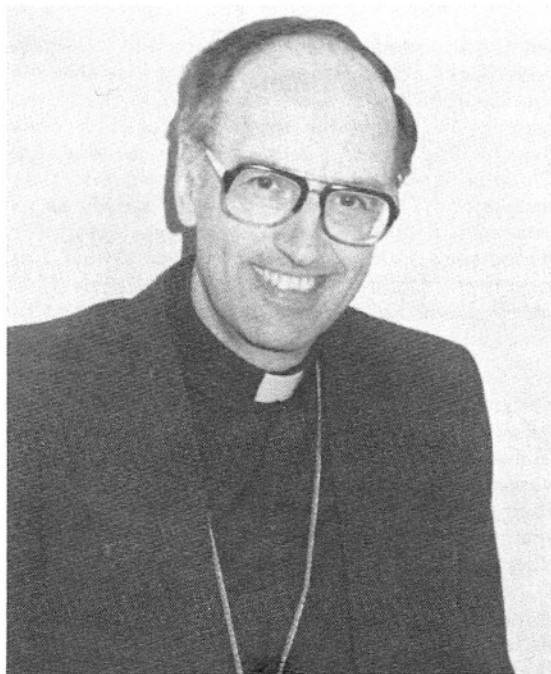
Spring seemed to be in the air at the end of March, as more than 30 people showed up for a United Church Camping Conference. You could also tell June was getting close, because the last three weekends of March were booked for marriage preparation classes, co-ordinated by Fathers Leo Hinz and Daniel Muyres.

In May the Globe Theatre touring group again made St. Peter's their "home" as they made their rounds in the schools in the area. We almost weren't able to accommodate the five actors because of other bookings. However, since the college students had gone home, some extra rooms for them were found.

Ron Evans, university chaplain, Saskatoon, brought his students in clinical pastoral training here for a few days together in early June. A Saskatchewan Status of Women group also met here for discussions the second weekend of June.

Father's Day weekend saw a good turnout for the annual AA roundup sponsored by the Humboldt AAs. Earlier in the week more than 40 librarians from across Canada got a quick tour of the press, farm, college and cathedral, as well as a hearty dinner, during their stopover at St. Peter's. That same week 35 members of the university hospital youth service staff gathered here for a couple days of assessment and evaluation.

Besides the various groups using the facilities, we continue to have the usual number of individuals coming for a day or a week of retreat or renewal, directed or alone. The guest who has stayed in Severin Hall the longest time this spring is Terry Sorochan, who has resided here since being hired as press manager March 1.

Our Benedictine Oblates

An Oblate Day was held on July 11, 1981, with twenty-four in attendance. The Oblates shared with the monastic community in Mass and Vespers. Father Abbot and Father Albert, Oblate Director, addressed the group in the afternoon. Following Vespers, Mrs. Anton Dierker, Mrs. Rose Kasun, Mrs. Helen Koob, Frederick and Irene Medernach, all of Cudworth, and Mrs. Peggy Mahon, Mrs. Rosalind McDermott and Franz Henn of Saskatoon were enrolled as candidates. Miss Mary Boddy, Mrs. Jessica Latshaw, Bob and Bette Lemke, all of Saskatoon, made their final oblation as Oblates. The other Oblates publicly renewed their oblation. The day concluded with an outdoor supper.

On November 21 and March 20 Oblate Meetings were held at St. Peter's Abbey. Father Maurice Weber addressed the Oblates on both occasions, on Good Zeal and on Prayer in the Rule of St. Benedict. Oblates of St. Benedict are Christian men and

women admitted into spiritual union and affiliation with a Benedictine community so that they share in the spiritual life, prayers and good works of the community. Within the framework of their daily lives in the world, Oblates strive to lead full Christian lives enlightened by personal efforts to understand Christ's teaching in the Scriptures as interpreted by St. Benedict in his Rule. The Benedictine community at St. Peter's now has twenty-six Oblates who have made their final oblation and twelve who have been enrolled as candidates.

Twenty-four oblates registered for the July 10, 1982, Oblate Day. Abbot Jerome was main celebrant and homilist at the mass and also addressed the oblates in the afternoon. Following vespers with the community, the oblates renewed their oblation and received the papal blessing. At the same ceremony Mary Bantle and Nellie Rudnitski of Cudworth were enrolled as Oblate Candidates. Franz Henn, Saskatoon, and the following from Cudworth: Mrs. Anton Dierker, Mrs. Rose Dasun, Mrs. Helen Koob, Frederick and Irene Medernach, made their final oblation as Oblates. The day concluded with an outdoor supper with the community.



Efforts were made to direct as much spring run-off as possible into our water-supply reservoir.

Water Supply

Brother Francis Fortney and Brother Gregory Brodner anxiously watched the channel leading to the water reservoir as the spring thaw set in. The scarcity of snowfall during the winter and spring months did not promise an abundant flow of water. A check on March 15 showed that there was eight feet of water left in the reservoir. Ice formed forty-three inches of the level and the remainder was available water. In spite of the slow spring thaw two feet of water was siphoned or pumped, or flowed into the reservoir. Another foot of water was added by pumping from an adjacent reservoir.

To refill the adjacent reservoir used for garden and lawn irrigation a large pump and a mile of six

inch pipe was rented and approximately a million gallons of water was pumped from a slough on the neighbor's land.

Five inches of rain during May and June have helped maintain the water level. Brother Gregory, after the last check, reported that the present water level is the same as it was last year at this time. He added that regular rainfall during the summer months and moderate temperatures would assure an adequate supply for our own needs. It still would not enable us to supply water for others.

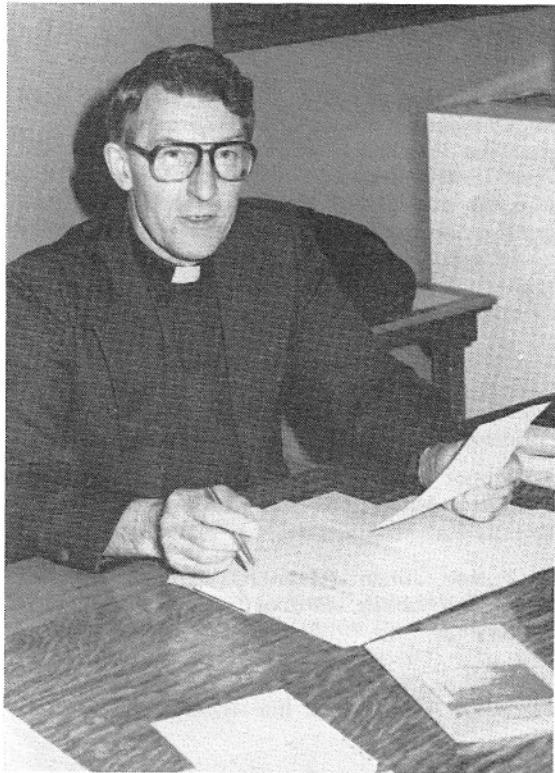

Father Maurice Weber

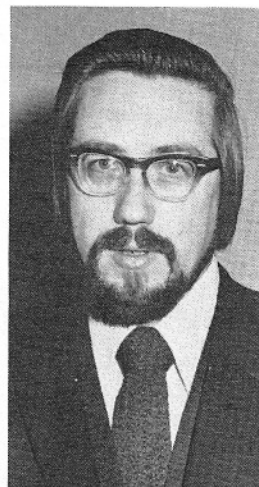
College principal

Father Albert Ruetz has been named dean of students, the position Father Maurice held. Sister Zita Maier, OSU, will be religious and social co-ordinator for the students.

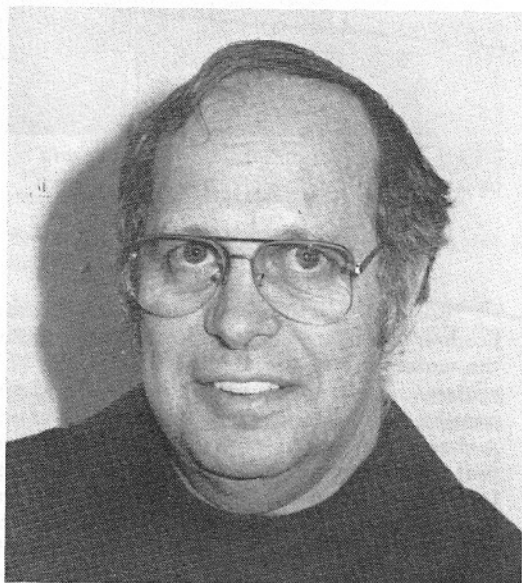

Patrick Jamieson (left) succeeded Brother Bede Hubbard as PM editor in June, 1981.

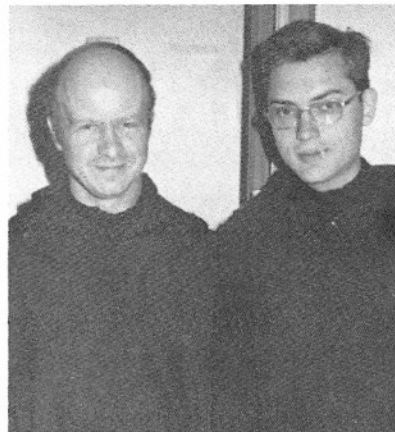

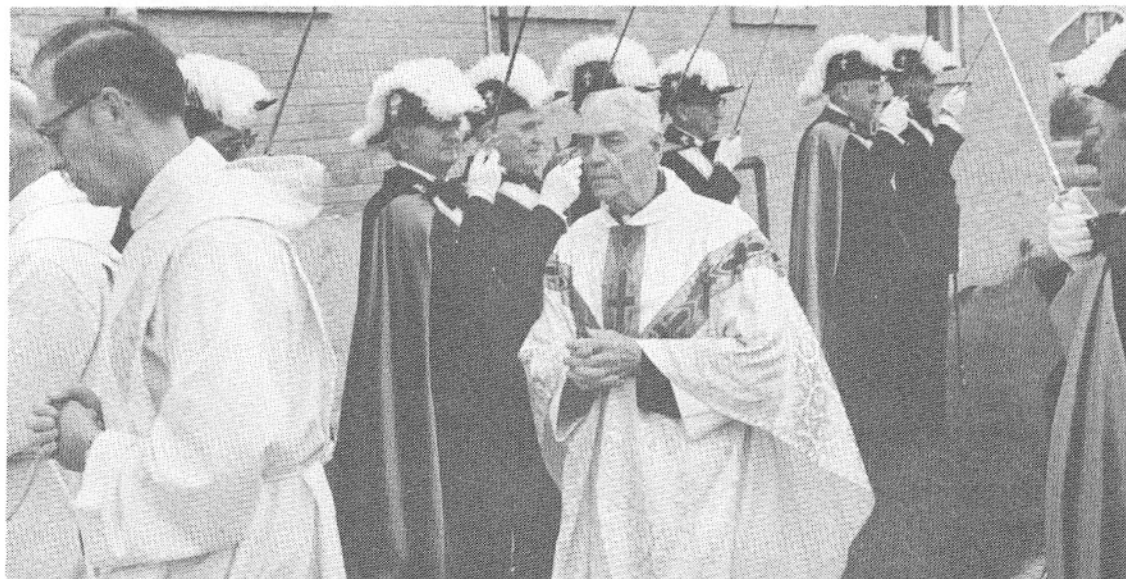


The new St. Peter's Press was officially blessed by Abbot Jerome Weber, August 31, 1981.

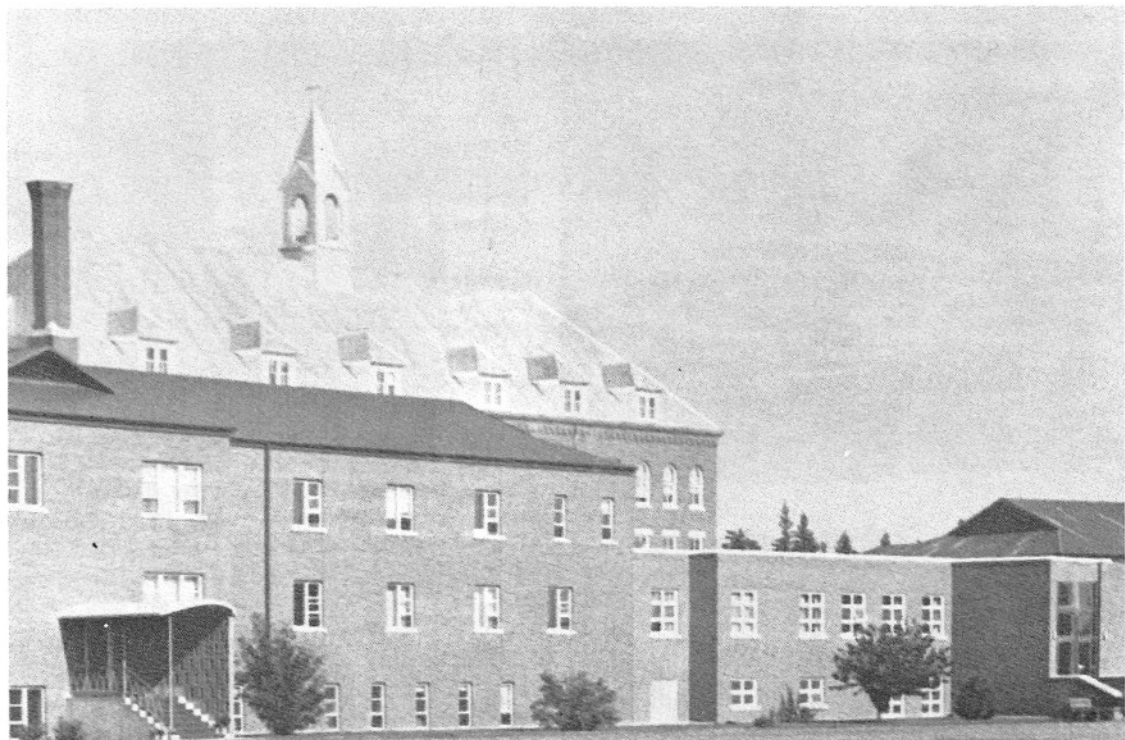
